## <u>Section 5 - General Rules</u>

- 1. This is a fun day so please do not be too strict on golf rules
- 2. If a ball goes into the rough or trees from the tee shot ALWAYS play a provisional ball in case you can't find the first one
- 3. From any ball going into the rough on a second / third shot only spend a minute or two looking, then drop a ball no more than 4 club lengths from point of entry into the rough with ONE penalty shot to be added to the score

- 4. If the ball comes to rest against an immovable object i.e a bench, a post or a staked tree then drop the ball no more than 4 club lengths from the object with no penalty shot.
- 5. If the ball is up against a fully grown tree you must play the ball where it is. If you decide to move it you will incur a penalty shot
- 6. If your ball ends up in the water then 1 penalty shot is to be added to the score for dropping the ball. The ball should be in line of entry after crossing the red / yellow stakes as far back as you want but no nearer to the hole. If you're using red stakes you can drop the ball 4 club lengths either side of the hazard again no nearer to the hole
- 7. A maximum of 6 strokes over par is allowed at each hole. For example if you are on a par 3 once you have played 9 strokes you must pick up your ball, on a par 4 it is after 10 strokes and on a par 5 it is on 11 strokes
- 8. If your ball is in the bunker the normal rules would state you should not ground your club before hitting the ball. This rule will not apply providing the ball is not moved. If it is then 1 penalty shot will be added to the score
- 9. If your ball lands in a small puddle in a bunker you can retrieve it and place the ball either side of the puddle but no nearer the hole with no penalty applied. If the bunker is full of water you may retrieve the ball and drop it a maximum of 4 club lengths from the edge of the bunker again with no penalty applied
- 10. If your ball lands on a green that is not the one you are playing on the ball must be retrieved & dropped 4 club lengths away from the edge of the green with no penalty

Under no circumstances in this instance must the ball be played off the green itself. Anybody caught doing so will suffer whatever punishment the club decide to apply to them. The putting surface is very delicate & damage takes weeks to recover. Keith Robinson will be on hand on the day to provide any further explanation that may be required.

#### Section 6 - Competitions To Be Played

We will be running 2 main competitions on the day a Stableford and a Gross competition.

#### <u>Stableford - A Brief Explanation</u>

Rather than counting the total number of strokes taken, as in stroke play, it involves scoring points based on the number of strokes taken at each hole. Unlike traditional scoring methods, where the aim is to have the lowest score, under Stableford rules, the objective is to have the highest score.

Stableford can have the added benefit of speeding up the pace of play, as once it is no longer possible to score a point, a player does not have to complete the hole but can simply pick up his/her ball and proceed to the next hole

The number of points awarded on each hole is determined based on comparison of the number of strokes taken to a fixed score, usually par. This fixed score is then adjusted in relation to the player's handicap. Once a player has taken two strokes more than the adjusted fixed score, he may pick up their ball as it is then not possible to score any points on that hole. They can then resume play on the next hole. Because of this, it is still possible to be competitive even allowing for a few bad holes. At the end of the round, the number of points scored on each hole is totaled to give a final score. The winner of a Stableford competition is the player with the highest point total

Scoring will work as follows:

#### Points Strokes taken in relation to adjusted fixed score

- 0 2 strokes or more over, or no score recorded
- 1 1 stroke over
- 2 Same number of strokes
- 3 1 stroke under
- 4 2 strokes under
- 5 3 strokes under
- 6 4 strokes under

#### **Gross - A Brief Explanation**

It involves counting the total number of strokes taken on each hole during a given round, or series of rounds. The winner is the player who has taken the fewest number of strokes over the course of the round, or rounds.

Players record the number of strokes taken at each hole and total them up at the end of a given round, or rounds. The player with the lowest total is the winner. In handicap competitions, the player would subtract their handicap from the total (gross) score to generate their net score, and the player with the lowest net score is the winner.[1]

Scores may be reported in relation to par for easy comparison with other golfers' scores. For example, a player whose score is three strokes over par after a given hole would appear as "+3" on the scoreboard.

There will be trophies on offer for those who come 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> in each of the Stableford & Gross competitions.

In addition to the 2 main competitions there will also be a Putting Competition on the day. It will cost £1 to enter and you will get to play 9 holes on the putting greens. The winner of this competition will have their name on a trophy which will be on display at Crawley Town & a £30 Meal Voucher For 2 at Donatellos in Brighton. In the event of a tie there will be a playoff to determine the winner. You may enter this competition as many times as you like as long as you pay your £1.

We will also be running competitions at the following holes:

- Hole 4 Nearest The Pin in 2 strokes
- Hole 5 Longest Drive
- Hole 6 Nearest The Pin
- Hole 8 Longest Drive
- Hole 10 Nearest The Pin
- Hole 13 Nearest The Pin
- Hole 14 Longest Drive
- Hole 15 Longest Drive
- Hole 17 Nearest The Pin
- Hole 18 Nearest The Pin in 2 strokes

For Nearest The Pin In 2 Strokes competitions your ball must be on the green with your 2<sup>nd</sup> shot. For Nearest The Pin competitions your ball must be on the green with your 1<sup>st</sup> shot. You must write your name on the marker sheet only if you are nearer than the name already on the sheet. Don't forget to move your marker to your position

For the Longest Drive competitions your ball must be on the fairway from your tee shot to count. This does not include the first cut from the rough. You must write your name on the marker sheet only if you are further than the name already on the sheet. Don't forget to move your marker to your position

For the winners of all the Nearest The Pin & Longest Drive competitions there will be a bottle of wine on offer as a prize. There will be further prizes on holes 6 & 17 to be announced on the day.



#### Section 10 - Proceeds of the day

All profits from this day will be split 50/50 between the Chestnut Tree Hospice & the Community Team at the Crawley Town Supporters Alliance.

Chestnut Tree House is the only children's hospice in Sussex and cares for 280 children and young adults from 0-25 years of age with progressive life-limiting conditions from Sussex and South East Hampshire.

Completed in 2003, the hospice provides a 'home from home' environment with 10 children's bedrooms plus eight family rooms, a wet and dry play area, computer and music rooms, a multi sensory room and hydrotherapy pool. The house is set in beautiful gardens within an area of outstanding natural beauty.

There are potentially 1,000 families with life-limited children in Sussex. Chestnut Tree House offers support for the whole family including psychological and bereavement support, end of life and short break care and sibling support.

The hospice costs £2.5 million per year to run. Families are never

charged for their care and less than 8p in every pound is funded by the government, so they rely heavily on the generosity, help and support of the people of Sussex.

At the Crawley Town Supporters Alliance our primary initiative for is our Community Coaching project. We pay for CTFC coaches to visit local schools and teach the children the value of football, improving their skills and introducing them to our wonderful football club. We also pay for places on the CTFC school holiday courses, which schools offer to their pupils as incentives for excellence.
